Honoring Women's Military Service

Delaware women who were members of the United States Armed Forces or the Delaware National Guard will soon be able to purchase a special vehicle license plate celebrating their service.

On Tuesday, Gov. John Carney was joined in Dover by Delaware National Guard Adjutant General Carol A. Timmons, lawmakers, and other officials as he signed [a bill creating the plate](#).

The new tag features a woman in a World War II-era uniform and a red poppy (an emblem of World War I) on a light green background. The words "Delaware Women's Military Monument" appear at the bottom of the tag.

A portion of the proceeds from the registration of the new plate will support the Veterans Trust Fund, administered by the Delaware Commission of Veterans Affairs.

Women have served the American military since the Revolutionary War, gaining the ability to become uniformed members during World War I. The new license plate will not be their sole recognition. A monument commemorating the service of Delaware's military women will soon be erected on the grounds of Legislative Hall in Dover.
